Walk Fest has taken place each year since 1999 and has become a firm favourite with both local walkers and those from much further away.

The programme has been carefully chosen so that there are walks to appeal to all ages and abilities. Many walks take in local and industrial history and give walkers an insight to the rich heritage of the area. Other walks take advantage of the surrounding hills and Lakeland Fells and take walkers to the Duddon and Rusland Valleys or have an activity focus such as sketching and wildlife observation.

Each walk will be led by a volunteer, local walk leader and wherever possible the starting point has been fixed so that it can be reached using public transport. The Walk Fest also has a number of supporting events open to the public. These include a talk by national broadcaster Eric Robson on 'Wainwright Redefined' and another by local author, Paddy Dillon on the Cumbria Way.

SATTERTHWAITE PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

Satterthwaite Parish Council last met on 12th March. The Police said that there were reports of poaching in the area but nothing was substantiated. Criminal damage was done to wooden posts and to a sculpture in Grizedale Forest. There have been a number of thefts from motor vehicles in the Grasmere area where valuables have been left on show, for example iPads and handbags. PCSO Laura Jackson asks that if there are any questions or concerns please to let her know and she will respond. The council is considering the feasibility of car parking for locals on the parcel of land behind the church. Following a site visit on Sunday 10th March to assess short- and long term actions to be taken, councillors resolved to raise a variety of issues with the relevant agencies. A letter from Mr Paul Tiplady posed a number of questions that councillors resolved to explore.

Councillors are determined to complete the Satterthwaite Community Plan. Through the local newsletters, they are to seek community representatives to form a committee, and will approach local organizations to send representatives to be on it. Councillors resolved to make the Community Plan the focus of the Annual Meeting of SPC on Tuesday 14th May. Through April, Mr Walker, the lengthsman, will continue with the work that he is currently doing: clearing the brash and drains between Force Forge and Force Mills.

Work in Nursery Lane has been done without expense to the council or community thanks to the generosity of the Forestry Commission (donated stone fillings) and Arthur Threlkeld (donated time and labour). The council recorded its gratitude to both parties.

It was resolved to hold the next Meeting on Tuesday 16th April 2013 at 7.30pm in the Satterthwaite Parish Room. Members of the public are welcome. COLTON PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

Flooding Issues: i) Your Council has written to County Chief Executive, and has received a reply, about the almost permanent flood and pot-holes at the 'Field of Pigs', near Finsthwaite. Highways have taken advantage of the recent dry weather and 'patched' the road there. A Highways officer has also recently met again with the owner to agree a way forward.

ii) Following our correspondence with Highways and the Lakeside Hotel, remedial work is now in progress to resolve the flooding problem in the dip by the Hotel.

Road Surface issues: County cut-backs have reduced regular visits by the Highways teams to twice a year, and we are beginning to see the effects of this. The Clerk keeps a list of Highways issues ready for when the teams do arrive, but please remember that you can contact the Highways teams yourself at any time to come out and deal with bad pot-holes (0845 609 6609 or email

<u>betterhighways.southlakeland@cumbria.gov.uk</u>), and they usually come fairly promptly.

Lengthsman: Tony Atkinson is suffering with a bad back at the moment, and we extend our sympathies to him (particularly those who know what it's like!). Please be patient about roadside issues for the time-being until he recovers. But of course, if there is a pressing issue, then do get in touch with the Clerk and she will try to arrange for it to be dealt with.



CHURCH NEWS

Dear Friends.

As human beings we quite often get the wrong end of the stick about things. It is usually accidental, but because something is not quite what we expect, we misunderstand completely.

The Easter stories are full of people getting the wrong end of the stick. Mary thinks Jesus' body has been stolen. Peter sees the linen wrappings and can't work out what it's all about. The disciples didn't understand the scriptures. The angels question Mary and she still doesn't know what's going on. Then she thinks Jesus is the gardener. Then, it seems, she reaches out to cling on to him, and he tells her she mustn't. You could hardly get more misunderstandings into a couple of paragraphs if you tried.

The point is, of course: Easter has burst into their world, the world of space, time and matter, the world of real history and real people and real life, but their minds and imaginations were unable to contain it, so they did their best to put the ocean into a bottle and fit the explosive fact of the resurrection into the possibilities they already knew about.

I think this is all rather comforting for us. Sometimes we get a sense that there is more to life than the here and now, there is a depth to existence that cannot be measured by scientific instruments, a spiritual dimension, just as real, but rather more elusive than the other dimensions. The confusion in the Easter story reminds us that are not alone if we don't understand it, but the message of Easter is that we are also not alone if we decide to explore it.

DON'T LET PAYDAY LOANS GET OUT OF HAND!

Payday loans are a fast but often dangerous way to borrow money and can have damaging long-term consequences. In the last 4 years across the UK, there has been a 10-fold increase in clients with payday loan debt, and this will only increase as more people feel the financial squeeze. We strongly urge anyone experiencing difficulties with a payday loan or thinking of taking one out to visit their local Citizens Advice Bureau and get advice about alternatives. We can advise you on which debts to prioritise and your right to stop payday lenders taking money straight out of your bank account, as well as helping negotiate an affordable repayment plan with the lender on your behalf.

To make sure that people aren't getting treated unfairly, Citizens Advice is monitoring how well pay day lenders are sticking to their Good Practice Customer Charter. You can play an important part in helping us monitor their behaviour by filling in the survey at www.adviceguide.org.uk. You'll also find advice and template letters to send to the pay day loan company and to the financial ombudsman if you've been wrongly treated. Take action now and get back control of your finances.
