COLTON PARISH COUNCIL NEWS


Lengthsman: Our Lengthsman, Archie Workman, has been working hard clearing drains at Rusland and Tottlebank during February and is now concentrating efforts on drains at Finsthwaite. He has removed some very large boulders which were blocking the flow of water under the church car-park, and has painted the safety railings there. He has also cleared the drain ("J.Clitheroe of Blackburn"!) by Rock Cottage which he says yielded more earth than any other drain he has cleared, and another ("Warhurst of Ulverston"!) by the signpost to Stott Park. Our County Councillor, David Fletcher, is to allocate some of his funds to aid further work at Finsthwaite/Stott Park, especially to open up the narrow culvert which channels the beck under the road towards the Bobbin Mill; severe flooding occurred on the road there last autumn.

Litter: We and a concerned local resident have been repeatedly contacting SLDC to clear the litter which accumulates at an extraordinary rate on the between Tollbar at the A590 and Bouth Road Ends. They have finally done so, but we notice it is already accumulating again. We have asked that they monitor this route and clear it frequently, and are waiting for a response. It seems that this road (a well-known commuter 'short-cut') is where people like throw their fastfood packaging out of the car windows - delightful. Traffic Speed: The same route is well-known for traffic travelling far to fast for the road and is a particular concern at Tottlebank Farm where stock may be on the road, and at Spark Bridge where children walk to the school bus stop in the morning. The speed limit at Spark Bridge is 30mph, but this is of course too fast for blind corners, for example by the bridge. We have asked the police to attend.

Flooding and Potholes at 'Field of Pigs', Finsthwaite: We have been in touch with Highways repeatedly about the appalling conditions on the road at the 'Field of Pigs' between Finsthwaite and Ealinghearth. Following many complaints and incidents of burst tyres, we asked Highways to cordon off the worst of the road, which they have now done. They have asked the owner of the field to remedy the situation by the end of the month.

Our next meeting is the combined Annual Parish Open Meeting and Annual Parish Council meeting on Tuesday 6th May, 7.30pm in Bouth Village Hall.

SATTERTHWAITE PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

SPC's next meeting will be on Tuesday 8th April 2014, 7.30pm in the Parish Room. Public and press are always welcome.

At the Meeting of 4th March, the parish council noted that a Notice of Grant of Planning Permission for Application 7/2013/5621 - Land to be developed Lakeside YMCA, National Centre, Lakeside – was subject to the signing of a Section 106 Planning Obligation.

An email from Mrs Townsend (11th February) asked: "The PC often asks parishioners to advise about areas that may need the attentions of our wonderful lengthsman. One such is the lane from Satterthwaite up Breasty Haw, uphill of the graveyard, where the vegetation and forest have overgrown the tarmac by some 18" on the right hand side going up. This means that any larger vehicles like the oil delivery and refuse collection trucks have to drive with their nearside wheels on the opposite verge. This is a nothrough road and there are only two (second) homes up there, so I realise it is not a high priority. But worthy of attention at some stage, hopefully." The council resolved to add the work to the list of jobs for the lengthsman and to ask him to liaise with the Forestry Commission to see if it has and/or will accept any responsibility to clear the tree growth.

The lengthsman still has work to be done at Dale Park and surrounds (tree clearing). The Forestry Commission is to do work from Bridge Bottom to Dale Park and onwards, clearing saplings. Work was completed on bridleways and drains were cleared around the Triangle south to Gym House.

In response to a request to Connecting Cumbria for better mobile phone reception [3G strength on local arterial roads], an email was received on 4th February: "The Connecting Cumbria project is charged with building a fibre network around the county to facilitate the delivery of high speed fibre internet access by a fixed line solution. Our aim is to bring minimum speeds of 2mbps to everyone and 24mbps to 93% of homes and businesses by the end of 2015. This does not include upgrades to mobile phone coverage. However there is a project, led by the Lake District National Park Authority to extend mobile phone coverage to areas that are currently have no mobile coverage. This is called the Mobile Infill Project known as MIPs. Further details of the Connecting Cumbria project can be found on our website at

www.connectingcumbria.org.uk including information on Connecting Communities."

Councillor Fletcher reported on the High Furness
Neighbourhood Forum meeting, 27th February, that
focussed on public health and the various organisations
which are responsible for commissioning and improving
services for the public across the County. He asked the
clerk to write to David Lowe to draw attention to the
concern expressed about the conduct of an event last
Sunday (2nd March) - on-road parking, absence of
stewards, etc. The council acknowledged that the Forestry
Commission may not be involved in the organisation of
such an event but felt it had a duty of responsibility to bring
the issue to the FC's attention, especially the with
frequency of events planned in March.

Councillors asked the clerk to seek clarification about the levels of toxicity discussed in the Geological Disposal Facility-siting Process Consultation Responses.

CHURCH NEWS

Dear Friends.

My favourite television programme is back for a second series - the Great British Sewing Bee. I make to claims about my sewing, but I do enjoy making soft furnishings especially curtains and cushions.

And curtains lead me on to a legend that Mary, as a young woman brought up in the precincts of the Temple in Jerusalem, was much occupied with weaving the veil of the Sanctuary, especially the precious purple and scarlet threads.

This veil, or curtain, hung in front of the Sanctuary, the Holy of Holies and the Ark of the Covenant, as a sign of the unbridgeable gulf between humanity and God. No one is allowed behind this curtain, except once a year when the High Priest enters to intercede between God and his people.

But as Mary labours away at this sign of separation, she is interrupted at her work. You could say God steps through the curtain himself to enter the holy place of a human body, thus breaking through all our efforts to contain him.

It is hard not to miss in this legend the strongest echo of all: the curtain in the Temple being torn in half as Jesus gives his last cry from the cross, allowing us all to enter the Sanctuary of Heaven with him.

Just as Mary is interrupted spinning the thread for the curtain, so our whole world is interrupted by this cry of Jesus, and all we try to put between ourselves and God is torn down. We can all weave and sew our own individual curtains of separateness. How much of the energy of the Church, and of each one of us, is devoted to avoiding the reality of our relationship with God? Perhaps Lent may be a time for all of us to examine and reflect on what separates us from God.
