RUSLAND HORIZONS

There will be a community event on the late afternoon/evening of May 9th which will give local people a chance to find out much more detail about the projects we plan to start next year and there will be free food - please put this in your diary NOW. There will be more details next month and on the website (www.ruslandhorizons.org). Meanwhile, Marian Jones and the rest of the team are busy preparing for our midterm review with the Heritage Lottery Fund at the end of April. The Landscape Character Assessment (complete with some stunning pictures!) and our Audience Development & Interpretation Plan, to which some of you may have contributed, are now complete and can also be found on our website. We are involved in some pilots studies including a great project call Full Cycle which is helping to show young lads and lasses from South Cumbrian towns more about the countryside and getting them involved in some of the traditional woodland skills. We are also working with the Rusland Reds pilot project run by Westmorland Red Squirrels. Finally, our Facebook page is nearing the magic 100 likes - please like us, if you haven't already (and keep in touch with what's going on)!

POACHER ALERT!

The Wildlife Rangers at Grizedale tell us that we are in the middle of the worst spate of deer poaching they have known. Gangs are targeting this area right now, as the deer come down to the valley floor fields at night; the hinds are pregnant and cannot move as fast to escape lurcher dogs. PLEASE – everybody – be vigilant; report any suspicious nocturnal activity immediately to the police on 101, or if a crime is being committed, ring 999. The more of us that get on to the police about this rural crime, the more likely they are to start taking it seriously. COLTON PARISH COUNCIL

Private Water Supply Testing - correction: You may have read the press release from South Lakeland District Council (SLDC) in our recent Colton PC newsletter about compulsory testing of water supplies. The press release stated that SLDC was legally required to carry out risk assessments on all private supplies in the district, to make sure they meet Drinking Water Inspectorate (DWI) standards, and that the cost of the assessment is borne by the householders on the supply. We are grateful to a local resident for pointing out that this is not quite the case: a water supply that serves only one private domestic dwelling where no commercial activity takes place, is exempt; these supplies will only be sampled and riskassessed at the request of the owner or occupier. We have been in touch with SLDC who have apologised if anyone felt misled, explaining that the legislation is quite complicated to explain succinctly. LDNPA Sale of woodland at Waterside Knott, Newby Bridge: Your Council expressed its concerns to the National Park Authority about their proposed sale of this important ancient semi-natural woodland, asking that i) if the woodland had to be sold, that the LDNPA ensure sale to a responsible buyer who will manage and maintain the woodland in line with the landscape, wildlife and cultural aims and duties of the Authority, in perpetuity if possible, ii) that the permissive paths be dedicated as formal rights of way, before sale, and iii) that the tower be protected. The LDNPA has confirmed that they would be in a position to determine a responsible buyer, and that a restrictive convenant was already in the deeds to ensure public access, forestry or agricultural use and protection of the deciduous woodland. We have just heard that the permissive paths have now been dedicated as formal rights of way. The tower is Grade II listed which brings with it certain planning protections.

BRATHAY RESIDENTIAL for young people 19th – 21st June 2015

The Windermere Deanery (Church of England) is organising a weekend residential for young people who live in the Hawkshead/ Windermere area. The residential will take place at Brathay Hall from Friday evening of the 19th June 2015 to Sunday 21st June 2015. There is space for up to 20 young people who are from year 7 upwards (aged 11 – 16). The weekend will be staffed by 2 female and 2 male leaders who will have undergone relevant DBS checks, as well as the Brathay Hall staff. The accommodation comprises of five rooms that sleep four, and there are two further rooms for leaders. All meals and bedding is provided, as well as equipment for outdoor activities. During the course of the weekend there will be time for young people to get to know each other; there will also be Christian input. On the Saturday we will have a full day of outdoor activities led by qualified instructors from the Brathay Trust. This could include water sports, scrambling and high rope activities.

The actual cost of the residential is around £100 per person, but because of substantial funding from a local trust we are able to offer the weekend for £30 per young person on a first come first served basis.

MAKE SURE YOU CAN VOTE ON MAY 7th

People have to be on the electoral register by 20 April to be able to vote in the General Election on 7 May. The registration system changed on 10 June 2014. Previously, one person in every household was responsible for registering everyone else who lived at that address. Under the new 'Individual Electoral Registration' each person is now required to register to vote individually, rather than by household. South Lakeland District Council sent a letter to every residential property in South Lakeland at the end of January. This letter showed who is currently registered to vote. If you were not included on the letter but you live at the address you need to register. You can register at www.gov.uk/register-to-vote or telephone the Electoral Services Office on 01539 733333, they can register you online or send you a paper form.
