MYSTERY OF THE MISSING METAL?

UKRAINIAN CRISIS DONATIONS

RUSLAND HORIZONS Broadening Horizons project with Furness College

In March we had two wonderful days with the Furness College students at Glass Knott Woods. Gareth and Ro Thomas, of Woodmatters, ran the event and shared their extensive knowledge. encouraging the students to take part in activities such as fire lighting, whittling, bread and rope making and hunting for animal tracks. The next two events will be held towards the end of March and will include a day of soil analysis and biodiversity assessment as part of our Colton Parish Greening project, plus a three-day residential at Rookhow to learn more bushcraft skills, traditional woodland skills, such as coppicing, and creation of an artwork piece under the guidance of a very talented artist, Sue Flowers, funded by UCLan, our other key partner on this project.

Problems with vehicles following their satnav onto unsuitable roads have continued and the PC is looking for funding to tackle this via warning signs. Overdue safety improvements to the A590 are still being developed by the agencies and councils involved.

Meanwhile the Parish Council unanimously supported a planning application for calf housing, a midden and storage building submitted by the Messrs Crowe at Hall Farm, Rusland.

The next meeting, which will be the Parish Open Meeting andthe Parish Annual Meeting will be at Bouth Village Hall on Monday, 16th May.

CHURCH NEWS

Dear Friends

Writing about current affairs in a publication that appears some time later probably isn't sensible, as things are likely to change and words will be out of date. But at the time of writing, we are in a state of shock because something we thought impossible as happened: for the first time in 83 years, one European country has invaded another. We thought it couldn't happen. Some of us are also surprised that Ukraine, which surrendered its nuclear weapons in return for quarantees of security. can apparently hold out for so long now those guarantees have been done away with. And, living as we do 1500 miles away, we feel absolutely helpless. This month the church celebrates the most important of all Christian festivals: Easter, when we remember Christ rising from the dead. If this celebration pretended that everything was always ok and nothing bad every happened, then this year, and probably most years, it would sound like hollow platitudes. But before we celebrate Easter in Church we have Lent when we remember that humans are capable, and have always been capable, of terrible deceitfulness, violence, greed and destruction. Then comes Good Friday, the day on which we remember that Jesus was crucified, a man nailed to a cross in agony. Dreadful things happen. Good Friday happens. It is happening today to many Ukrainians. Christ went to his death because of human hatred, the same hatred we see in war today. Good Friday happens, but then Easter happens. Out of death comes life. Christ rose again because human hatred is never stronger than God's indomitable love. From where we are it is very difficult to see, but after crucifixion comes resurrection. God will turn even our worst sins into part of a story of grace. God will lift up the downtrodden and uphold the oppressed. We don't always see it in this life, but in the end God's love has the last word. You are warmly invited to our Easter services and Passion Play. John


REFUGEES




