COUNTING THE BIRDS THAT ARE COUNTING ON YOU It will be all eyes to the skies on Saturday, 25th and Sunday, 26th January 2014, as the nation takes part in the RSPB's annual Big Garden Birdwatch. The activity is the biggest garden wildlife survey in the world and last year almost 600,000 people counted the birds in their garden. Big Garden Birdwatch, which has been running for 35 years, provides the RSPB with masses of information about changes in numbers of garden birds in winter, and helps to alert conservationists to significant declines in UK garden species such as house sparrows and starlings.

This year, for the first time, we need you to log some of the other wildlife you see in your garden too. We want to know whether you ever see deer, squirrels, badgers, hedgehogs, frogs and toads in your gardens, to help build an overall picture of how important our gardens are for giving all types of wildlife a home.

To take part, spend just one hour at any time over the Big Garden Birdwatch weekend noting the highest number of each species seen in your garden or local outside space at any one time. Then simply submit your results to the RSPB, either online at www.rspb.org.uk/birdwatch or in the post.

The council sends seasonal greetings to all in the parish.


SPC's next meeting will be on Tuesday 21st January
2014, 7.30pm in the Parish Room.

At the meeting of 26th November PCSO Emma Forrester reported criminal damage to a barrier in Grizedale Forest and the arrest of a suspect related to charity box thefts in the area. Of great concern to the Cumbria Police is the rise in sheep and livestock theft at this time of the year. Of the £413,000 of livestock thefts over the last three years, £368,761 related specifically to sheep thefts. The public are asked to report anything suspicious to the police on the non-emergency 101 number.

The council is keen to maintain the Neighbourhood Watch signs in the village and PCSO Forrester, agreeing that new signs will create the right impression, will try to arrange this quickly. The clerk receives regular email alerts from the NW scheme but has no way of circulating them to the community at large. Anyone wishing to be kept informed should submit an email address to the clerk.

Although it is unlikely that better broadband reception will reach all corners of the parish it is important that individuals register an expression of interest online at

www.connectingcumbria.org.uk/when-and-where In January the council will be discussing its budget for 2014 – 2015. The most costly item is likely to be the re-employment of the lengthsman. To date the council has received grants for his work. In future it will have to be covered by the precept. Grants required by the community need to be renewed. Those wishing to be involved in the debate should attend the meeting or send comments via email to the clerk. To achieve a larger involvement in its business the council urges parishioners to send their email addresses to the clerk. Many of the issues and concerns of 2013 will be carried into 2014, hopefully to successful completion.

COLTON PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

Highways: After some pleading from the Clerk, the local County Highways team has repaired two collapsed culverts at Colton: i) 'Vicarage Corner' where there was a constant deluge of water across the road and ii) on the Snows near Riddingside Farm where the water had washed away much of the tarmac. The team has also been repairing potholes, and has tried to rod the notorious drain at Bouth Road Ends that keeps clogging up; a gully-sucker and jetter is being sent to clear the whole drain. Whilst we know that the local team is doing its very best in the face of dwindling resources, the question remains that all our roads are deteriorating markedly with very little routine maintenance being done. Needless to say, Colton is not the only parish dismayed at the state of the roads. We will be attending a meeting shortly between South Lakeland parishes and both the Highways Manager (Nick Raymond) and the County Cabinet Member for Highways (Keith Little). Meanwhile our temporary Lengthsman, Archie Workman, is doing great works around the Parish, clearing drains where he can, and cutting back verges. He removed from the drain below Lin Bridge a huge length of matted earth which he christened the 'Rusland Slug'! If you need Archie to visit your patch, please contact the Clerk.

'Community Grants and Engagement Review' which
would include three representatives from Parish
Councils in the NF area; one of these representatives

CHURCH NEWS

Dear Friends.

Once upon a time there was a King, who fell in love with a beautiful peasant girl. But how could he declare his love? If he went to all dressed in his royal finery, he reckoned that she would be so alarmed at the appalling prospect of having to behave as a queen that she would turn him down.

Or perhaps she would feel compelled to say 'yes' because she thought it her duty to obey her sovereign, and, being a good man, that wasn't the kind of relationship he wanted.

So instead of going dressed as a king, he wondered about pretending to be a peasant to make his proposal. But that was no good either. Even if she fell in love with him, when she realised that he was a king, she would say that she had agreed to marry him under false pretences.

What could he do? There was only one solution. He would actually have to become a peasant himself. It was the only way, and he took it. He abdicated as king, married the humble maiden, and lived happily ever after.

That story, more or less, was told over by the Danish philosopher, Soren Kiekergaard. It is a story he used to help us to understand the meaning of Christmas.

We, the human race, are of course the peasant girl, and we are loved deeply and utterly and passionately by the King who is God, who comes to us in the person of Jesus. We being mere mortals are unable to recognise the utterly mysterious God in his full glory, and even if we could, what we'd give wouldn't be love but grudging obedience. Yet if God had come down to earth and pretended to be human, like some of the Greek Gods did in ancient legends, we would not be convinced.

If God wants human beings to know him and love him, then the only way is to actually become one of us. And that is what Christmas is about.

If you shop using Ebay then don't get caught out buying from outside the UK where your consumer rights are not as strong if there's a problem. Under 'Item Location' select 'UK only' to generate a list of items that are within the UK. Sending parcels can be expensive. If you have internet access you could consider using www.Myhermes.co.uk it is cheaper than Royal Mail and they collect from your home. There's also Collect+ if you can drop your parcels off at one of their collection outlets, more info at www.Collectplus.co.uk

To keep costs sensible amongst relatives or work colleagues, how about a 'Secret Santa'. Each person in the group buys just one gift for an agreed amount of money, all the gifts are gathered together and each person receives one without knowing who purchased it.

Even though it's Christmas, get your priorities right and don't fall behind on the routine bills. If you do get into money difficulties, get advice as soon as you can from your local Citizens Advice Bureau (CAB).
