#### Planning

As councillors we receive numerous issues raised by parishioners re planning some of which we can answer immediately and others we refer to the National Park Planning for a resolution. The planners ask the Parish Council to be the eyes and ears re possible planning issues but we have become concerned that despite raising these we have little feedback and often this takes up to twelve months. Due to these concerns we arranged a meeting with three members of the planning department to attempt to address the situation and see if we could improve communication. The meeting was constructive and both the council and planners have a better understanding of the process and concerns, Individual outstanding issues were discussed which hopefully will be resolved, but only time will tell.

#### Community Grants

The council has allocated an amount of money to support community organisations which could make use of additional funds to provide new or replacement items, or towards minor repairs, or it could help a community group buy equipment.

#### CHURCH NEWS

#### Dear Friends.

'It is better to give than to receive' we are told, and of course this is true. So, are we better at giving then receiving? Many people would say 'no. All around them they see how people try to get as much as they can from life, without giving all that much in return. The question on people's lips and in their hearts often seems to be 'what can I get?' rather than 'what can I give?'

But maybe that is overly harsh on the human race. In the right circumstances people are pretty good at giving of themselves. And most people at some stage in their lives will give something to somebody else that really costs them, particularly within families.

Actually, I suspect that many of us are oddly poor at receiving. If somebody is very generous to us, then we become a little suspicious. We wonder what the hidden agenda is and what we will owe in return. We fear that by receiving charity we appear weak and powerless.

Although on the whole it is better to give than to receive, receiving can be pretty good, if we manage to do it properly. Christmas, I believe, is more about receiving than about giving. This may seem an odd thing for me to say. I do not mean that is about what presents we receive and unwrap. Instead, it is about receiving the greatest gift of them all - the fact that God Almighty became human and shared his life among us. The God we believe in is not distant and remote; he is immediate and alongside us, intimately involved in the nitty-gritty of his creation. This is what Christmas is about: it is about receiving a gift so enormous the world cannot contain it; a gift so generous, it is beyond our comprehension. All we have to do is swallow our pride and accept it graciously.
