A wealth of local talent was on show in Rusland Reading Room on Friday night at an evening of light theatrical entertainment in aid of the benefice of Hawkshead and Sawrey and Rusland and Satterthwaite. The first of two plays The Space Between the Years by John Scholes saw Zoz from Jupiter (John Dixon) resplendent in full Tudor attire looking wonderfully bemused as an alien who thought he had landed in Ye Olde Spotted Cow Hotel in Elizabethan days rather than 21st century. With expert comic timing much fun was had in the misunderstandings of language and culture of differing times and planets. Mellissanda (Helen Tasker) delightfully captured the sullen put-upon receptionist muttering 'it's not my job' whenever her landlady boss Doris (Liz Cringle with fine Yorkshire accent) asked her to do anything. Having seen that Zoz possessed a large bag of sovereigns Doris sashayed her way around the bar using all her charms to relieve him of his wealth while her husband was ill upstairs. All was resolved when a robber (Mike Derry) turned out to also be from Jupiter and unable to return seemed the perfect companion for Zoz. Produced by Mike Derry with help from Karen Warren and Danny Dawson (costumes) and John Dawson (props) Vernon Chapman and Kevin Chapman (sound effects). Catastrophe at the Vet's is written with great powers of humour and observation by local writer Jean Crabtree. With a large cast it centres around Denise (Elizabeth Mallett) a receptionist more concerned with her birthday and fiancé Jake than the riot going on . With great aplomb, a striking blonde wig and a bottle of brandy she deals with the new vet (Vernon Chapman), an irate customer (David Shaw), a brick through a window, constant phone calls, noisy parrot, sick elderly lady (Jean herself) and more to great hilarity. This was produced by Evelyn Marsh with sound effects by Kevin Baverstock. Hard to imagine how the wellchosen casts of both plays managed to get through the rehearsals. Their enjoyment provided a truly entertaining evening.

Thanks go to Elsie Wilkinson and all her helpers for the delicious supper provided in the interval. £430 was raised to be shared between Rusland and Satterthwaite Churches.

The performance to a packed house of 120 at Hawkshead Market Hall the following evening raised approximately £950.

COLTON PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

The National Park and South Lakeland Council have commissioned the Cumbria Rural Housing Trust (CRHT) to conduct a new housing needs survey to be conducted in Colton this year. You may remember that the first survey was conducted 4 years ago, and this found that 17 households in the Parish would be in housing need within the next 5 years. The demand was principally for affordable housing for rent. Judith Derbyshire, from the CRHT is planning to come to speak to the Council at our next meeting on 25th July to discuss the format of the new survey. Remember that Colton residents are eligible for the affordable housing being built at the old Satterthwaite School site. If interested, contact Eden Housing on 01768 861470 for an application form.



CHURCH NEWS

Dear Friends.

In the British Museum in London they have stones for use with a sling as a weapon, which had been dug up in Israel by archaeologists. They are about the size of cricket balls- the stones that is, not the archaeologists. Apparently, thrown expertly with a sling they could travel at about 100 miles per hour. I imagine that must take a lot of practice. You probably remember the story of David and Goliath. Goliath is the baddy, a giant soldier stronger than anyone else. David is a shepherd boy, who with a sling and just such a stone, went out with great courage and faith in his God. Exit giant, hit on the head by the stone.

You may remember that when David first saw Goliath, David was up on a hillside and Goliath was in the valley below. You can imagine that from up there the giant did not look so big, but as David moved down and moved closer, the giant would have looked bigger and bigger and more and more threatening.

That is how our problems sometimes appear to us- the nearer they get, the bigger and heavier they feel, but they are really the same size as they always were. Sometimes it is very easy for us to get things out of proportion. Somebody has imagined what David's reaction must have been when he saw the giant close up. His first thought was, 'He's big!', or words to that effect, but his next thought was, 'Good, that means I can't miss!' Some of our problems are only as big as we make them and can be cut down to size with a bit of courage and the kind of faith in God that David had in the famous story.

While most working people take their right to paid holidays for granted, many others are forced to work all year without a break, or only allowed unpaid leave. People missing out tend to be in unglamorous but essential jobs in small, non-unionised workplaces such as care homes, hairdressers, bars, restaurants, hotels and shops. Others work in building and decorating, clothing and food processing factories, or contract cleaning. The majority are women, many juggling part-time work with family commitments.
