COLTON PARISH COUNCIL

Despite the upsurge of Corvid cases, parish councils cannot legally meet via Zoom, so it was with a bare minimum of 5 councillors that Colton Parish Council met at Bouth Village Hall on Monday 10th January. Items on the agenda included:

- planning applications at Thwaite Head, New Close Farm and Lakeside
- the vacancy for a councillor for Central Ward
- problems with off-roaders on green lanes
- satnav issues near Riddingside Farm
- progress with the 'Greening Our Highways' projects
- the effects and repercussions from Storm
- expenditure on Bouth Village Green and the Finsthwaite Clock
- the work of the Lengsthman

LDNPA have recently let the deer shooting rights in their woodlands in the Parish and a member of the public expressed concern over the safety of the woodland footpaths for dog walkers, conservation volunteers, orienteering competitors, visitors and locals. The Parish Council agreed to raise this with the LDNPA. The Parish Council budget and precept onto our Council Tax bills for 2022/23 was discussed and approved after a member of the public reminded the Councillors of the need to be 'cost conscious'.

The Parish Council will shortly be inviting applications from local groups, village hall committees etc. for grants under the Community Grants scheme. The grants criteria along with other financial information and documents are on the website www.coltonparishcouncil.org.uk The next meeting will be at Finsthwaite Village Hall on 21st February

ROOK HOW NEWS

Renovation work is progressing well at Rookhow, with the historic stone Meeting House floor having been relaid with insulation and underfloor heating pipes which will be powered by an air source heat pump to be installed shortly.



The accessibility of the building will be improved with a wider side entrance and the addition of an accessible toilet. The work is due to be completed by 15th April, when Rookhow will be open for the annual Good Friday Meeting at 11am to which local people are welcome to attend. We will also be opening Rookhow on a regular basis from May- 2 days a month for the public to visit and look around. The downstairs of the Meeting House will be open to bookings so if there are any local groups who would like to use the woodland or Meeting House, please let us know.

DALE PARK RAINFALL

The December total was 8.51" (2020 8.8") and there were 9 dry days (8 in 2020).
The yearly total rain for 2021 was 78.43" (88.17" 2020) so 10" less than the year before. I recorded172 dry days last year (146 in 2020).

CHURCH NEWS

Dear Friends.

C.S. Lewis once wrote "Prayer doesn't change God, it changes me." What is prayer? Essentially it means talking, and also listening, to God and it can be silent too. Many people, and not only committed Christians, find prayer helpful but it doesn't always come easily, especially the listening part.

A variety of factors may prompt us to pray including illness and other stresses but also wanting to thank God for something or to say sorry. Sometimes we praying for ourselves, sometimes for other people. People tend to pray more in war time and I'm sure that's also been true during the recent pandemic. Praying is a healthy thing to do - thanking God, counting our blessings and showing gratitude to those around us can all have a positive effect on our general well-being.

How do we actually pray and what words should be use? Jesus, as God's son, is an excellent model. He prayed often, typically early in the day, and he gave us the Lord's Prayer as a very useful starting point. Praying with other people can also be very helpful. Last year the local Anglican churches in this benefice introduced a regular prayer meeting at 12.30 pm on the last Thursday of each month by Zoom. The focus is wide-ranging and everyone is warmly invited. Please ask Rev John Dixon for the Zoom details.

Another encouragement for me has been discovering what's called 24/7 Prayer (easily accessible under that title on the internet) which is an international, interdenominational prayer movement which seeks to encourage continuous prayer (in shifts, not all by the same person!) It started in 1999 and has grown very rapidly. It may sound a bit gimmicky but I regularly use one of their apps called Lectio 365, an audio devotional resource which encourages Bible based prayer.

Let me finish with a simple prayer from the French Catholic priest Michel Quoist (1918-1997) "I am not asking you today, Lord, for time to do this and then that, but your grace to do conscientiously, in the time that you give, what you want me to do" (Prayers of Life).

HELP FROM CITIZENS ADVICE

Q. I want to do more shopping online, but I have heard that there are a lot of delivery problems.

A. Your contract is with the seller you bought the item from. It's the seller's responsibility to make sure the item is delivered to you. They should chase the courier to find out what happened to your order if there's a problem. If your parcel hasn't arrived, check the delivery address you gave the seller, to make sure it's correct. Then contact the seller and ask where your order is. If the seller claims they've delivered it or doesn't know where it is, you can ask for a redelivery. You might be able to get a refund in some circumstances where the delivery time was essential and you let the seller know ahead of time.

Under the Consumer Rights Act 2015, you can ask the seller to deliver the item to you again if the item wasn't delivered either by an agreed date, or within a reasonable time - usually within 30 days. If the new delivery fails to come within a reasonable time, you can ask the seller for a refund.

Another problem people face is when parcels get left in different places, for example outside or with a neighbour. If your item was delivered by Royal Mail, and they left your package with a neighbour or in a certain place because you told them to, it's not the seller or Royal Mail's responsibility if it gets lost. If they leave it somewhere you hadn't instructed, it's the seller's responsibility if it gets lost. You should contact the seller to ask for a redelivery or a refund. If the item was delivered by a courier, check your terms and conditions or account details - they might include other places for delivery, like your porch or a neighbour's house. If you agreed to them, it's not the seller's or courier's responsibility if your order has gone missing. However if you did not agree to this, then it's the sellers responsibility if your order goes missing. If you ordered something from a private seller or you're still having trouble after trying the tips above, you can contact the Citizens Advice consumer helpline for help.

We believe this charity radiates the kind of positivity that Jaysley always had helping give children their dreams back.


