# **RUSLAND HORIZONS**

Hedge planting event - Tim Fleming's - Thwaite Moss
Saturday 12th February saw a tremendous turnout of
volunteers for hedge planting on Tim Fleming's land
at Thwaite Moss, as part of the Colton Greening
Project and part-funded by Tim himself. Sadly, Tim, a
long-term supporter of Rusland Horizons and the
community in general, passed away shortly before the
event, following a long illness. His family encouraged
us to carry on with the event and we are sure that Tim
would have been pleased with both the turnout and
the product of the volunteers' activity. It can be

Under the experienced guidance of countryside ranger Andrew Wilkinson, the work carried out by the volunteers aimed to improve biodiversity and create essential wildlife corridors for many important species. The hedge plant will also protect the verge from off road traffic damage. Tim provided 600 whips for the hedge plant, which was also part funded by the Colton Parish Council Highways Greening Fund to help with additional material costs.

We hope that a successful hedge plant and a job well done, will serve as a fitting memory to Tim.

#### SATTERTHWAITE PARISH COUNCIL

We have had some pretty awful weather again recently with more power cuts. It is nice to see the community helping each other in these situations. It is good to check whether neighbours who are elderly, have small children or even people who are on their own are okay and ask if they need any help, or if you are someone who needs help don't be afraid to ask.

There has been lots of flooding in areas that are not normally affected. We are speaking to Archie to see when he will be able to have a look at those for us. The newly tarmacked area from Force Forge to just before Satterthwaite is already starting to show wear, with potholes appearing and the edges of the road crumbling. We have spoken to Highways and they are coming out to inspect the work, with the view to getting the contractors back to repair the road. They have been and marked other areas to repair and are due back early this month.

There was a recent incident, when a wagon turned into Nursery Lane, thinking it was a through road, and got stuck, making a mess and knocking walls down on its way. We will be writing to Forestry England to see what they can do to make good the damage that occurred and at the same time see if they can use money available from United Utilities to repair the huge potholes in the road, already there. We are contacting Highways to see if they can install a sign at the entrance to Nursery Lane, to stop people using the road, using funding from the Members Highways Budget.

#### COLTON PARISH COUNCIL

The meeting at Finsthwaite and Lakeside Village Hall on Monday 21st February, was attended by six councillors and eleven members of the public. The main item of interest for many, was the planning application, 'in principle', for five 'local needs custom built' houses in Bouth. After discussions and with participation from a number of local residents, the Councillors decided to object to the application. It is now up the LDNPA planners to consider the proposals.

Cllr Kate Tripp, from Windermere Town Council provided an update on the ownership of the Windermere lake bed particularly in the light of the local government reorganisation and the dissolution of SLDC. Both Cllr Matt Brereton from Cumbria CC and Cllr Ian Wharton from SLDC, submitted emailed reports on matters of interest, with the latter promising financial support to the local Green Sparks environmental project.

In view of the problems caused by the recent storms, especially Arwen, it was decided that the Councils community grants would, for 2020/21, be placed in a resilience fund and be earmarked for expenditure related to improving the resilience of village halls as community hubs.

Other issues on the agenda were various highways and flooding issues, planning applications in Nibthwaite, Finsthwaite, Lakeside, Bandrake Head and Bouth, and the successful first phase at Thwaite Moss of the Council's Greening the Highway project.

#### RUSLAND and DISTRICT W.I.

At the February meeting we remembered two of our members who had recently died -Jennifer Threlkeld who had been a member for more than 40 years and Marion Martindale from Finsthwaite who joined us a few years ago.

Our speaker was from Dalefoot Composts who use a variety of ingredients in their mixes including bracken, sheep wool and comfrey and definitely no peat. The compost they produce for tomatoes includes sheepwool and the plants require no further feeding. The composts can be delivered but are also available at local garden centres. Several bags were raffled in aid of our funds.

The next meeting will be via Zoom on Tuesday, 15<sup>th</sup> March at 7.30 p.m. when David Weild, former Chief Engineer on the submarine Astute will give a talk on submarines and is open to everyone. Details on how to connect are available from any member nearer the time.

# Dear Friends,

The season of Lent starts this year on 2nd March. When we think of Lent we think of giving things up. Of course, it is often pointed out that Lent needn't necessary be about giving things up- it could just as easily be about taking things on, something that would be good for us, or the people around us. So, we might be asking ourselves 'What should I do for Lent this year? What bad habit should I give up, or what good habit should I adopt?

Behind these questions lie two more very important questions, which really are worth asking ourselves. Firstly, what really matters? And secondly 'Why do I spend so much time and energy on other stuff?' The answer to the second question is often that we spend so much time on the other stuff because we haven't really worked out the first question.

Jesus said 'where your treasure is, there you heart will be also' (Mathew 6:21). The heart follows one's treasures. When we name our treasures, the things that are really important to us, we find ourselves, our very hearts. When we name our treasures, we begin to see (for better or worse) the direction in which our lives are headed. Some treasures enrich and grow life. Other treasures hold our hearts captive and impoverish life. Let us approach Lent as treasure hunters, discovering what we truly value, and where that is life enhancing, resolve to spend more time on it.

# **OBITUARIES**

Satterthwaite and the wider community have lost two dear characters, in the deaths of Robert (Bob) Fletcher on 20th January and Jennifer (Jen) Threlkeld on 21st January.

Bob grew up in Accrington, where he trained and worked as a butcher. He met and married Joan, and they had three children. The family took frequent caravan holidays in Hawkshead, and a chance meeting with Bill Grant, then Head Forester at Grizedale, led to Bob being offered a job with the Forestry. From an early age, Bob had always loved drawing, and coming to work at Grizedale enabled him to spend more time working alongside and studying wildlife. Bob and family moved to Laburnum Cottage, Satterthwaite. Following an injury, Bob left the Forestry Commission, and concentrated on developing his skill as a wildlife artist, working particularly in pastels. He started exhibiting his work locally, and eventually was travelling all over the country, exhibiting at shows and country fairs. This wider exposure earned him many commissions. Bob also had a great affinity with birds of prey, particularly owls, and rescued and rehabilitated many; they were housed in aviaries in the garden at Laburnum Cottage where visitors were encouraged to come and see and learn about them. Bob, Joan and David developed a wildlife studio at Laburnum Cottage which continues to attract many visitors.

Jennifer grew up in a farming family in Lancashire, moving to several farms before the family took Ormandy Farm (now the Grizedale Lodge) in 1959, when Jen was 15. Later she and her parents Betty and Leslie (Les) moved to Satterthwaite Farm, where Jen established a very successful poultry and egg business. She and Les also delivered milk in Satterthwaite. Jen embraced all aspects of village and valley life with enthusiasm. She was active in Young Farmers, played tennis, table tennis, darts and dominoes, was a very busy member of Rusland Valley WI, taking part in all their activities, and always exhibited at the Rusland Show. She was an enthusiastic driver, especially of sports cars. Jen also established a very successful holiday let business in a former stable at the farm. Jen eventually moved from the farmhouse into Stable Cottage in 2015. During recent years she had become virtually chair-bound, but still was a hub for friends to gather and chat; the cottage was always filled with laughter of people dropping in for a brew, and, in spite of not going out, Jen was always first with all the local news. She never once complained about her condition and was always up-beat and positive.

Bob and Jen will be sorely missed in the community and we send heartfelt condolences to both families.


